What does courage have to do with leadership? Everything.

Throughout my year as president of our Association, I have learned from and been inspired by the acts of courage and purpose our members demonstrate every day. At a time when the most publicized conversations about education often deteriorate into recriminations, blame, and the tendency to paint all with the broad stroke of the most rare and least common denominator, I had a year to focus on and celebrate the dreams and hopes of our children, the support and determination of their parents, the imagination and work ethic of their schools, and the clear vision and values of their school leaders, in particular.

More than any other time in my career, I was privy to the many things you do each day to fight a culture of divisive and polarizing gridlock; to support a culture of purpose, collaboration, and love for and responsibility to the children we serve. As the only people in our respective districts fulfilling the role of superintendent, we are understandably inclined to seek each other's counsel and support about the things that frustrate us the most. Chief among these are the increasingly politicized intrusions into local control, the conflict our community members experience as they express concern and doubts about education in general, and strong satisfaction with and support for education in our respective communities.

Sometimes we need to be reminded that Long Islanders support and are happy with the public education we all plan, lead, and deliver on a daily basis. We need to remind ourselves and each other of the Rauch Foundation 'Caring for Long Island's Children' poll that indicates Long Islanders are typically more successful and highly educated than in other parts of the country, and that the overwhelming majority of those Long Islanders were educated here. We need to remind each other and ourselves that "local schools are the pride of Long Island, and Long Islanders are hopeful about the future of their children growing up here."

We need to remind ourselves and each other that we are defined by the things we do and say each day, not by the headlines and rumors that may dominate water cooler conversation but do not represent the experience and reality of our communities. The proof of the pudding is in the tasting. In one of the few ways our community members can resoundingly communicate their support, they went to the polls this month and voted their approval for our record of excellence and transparency, accountability and continuity.

At the same time, we need to remind ourselves that it takes courage to keep moving from 'Good to Great,' as that terrific book guides us to do. It can take more courage to institute change when people are satisfied; when our communities do support us; when it would be more comfortable to develop a bunker mentality against the recriminations and inaccuracies that can dominate discussion about public education. Rudyard Kipling was right. Taking my own poetic license here, "If we can keep our heads when all about us are losing them and blaming it on us; if we can trust ourselves when many doubt us, but make allowance for their doubting, too; if we can wait and not be tired by waiting, or – being lied about, not deal in lies; if we can watch the things we give our life to be broken, and stoop and build them up with worn out tools, then we are superintendents, my friend!"

In closing this year, and moving forward, I know I will continue to derive much of my own courage from each of your individual examples as a superintendent, a community leader, a colleague, and a friend.

WORKING TOGETHER AS ADVOCATES FOR



The Suffolk County School Superintendents Association (SCSSA) Board of Directors spearheaded the first Suffolk County Children's Health and Safety Summit, which brought together the academic, political, social and health service leaders of Suffolk County. The focus of the summit was to initiate a dialogue and collaborative effort, with the goal of moving forward to improve the health and safety of all children residing in Suffolk County.

SCSSA President and Sayville School District Superintendent of Schools Dr. Rosemary F. Jones welcomed those in attendance, including Suffolk County Executive Steve Levy and Dr. Humayun J. Chaudhry, Commissioner of Health Services. Dr. Jones discussed the need to establish a working partnership between Suffolk County educators, government leaders, and health care providers, with the common goal of improving children's health in Suffolk County and across Long Island. The goals to raise awareness and create programs that support and educate parents, caregivers and children about the value of healthy decision-making and the need to provide improved social and health care services were also addressed during this workshop.

Suffolk County Executive Steve Levy spoke of the significant impact technology has had on children's health and how, in some ways, it has negatively altered their lifestyles. Levy described how computers, television and video games have created a passive environment where a virtual world consumes the days, decreasing the vital physical activity children gain on ball fields, parks and playgrounds.

Programs that connects students to specific health and lifestyle improvement, were also highly commended the work of the staff as well as the Suffolk County Department of Health Services, for their efforts in coming together to share their knowledge and resources in order to improve the health and enhance the lives of the children of Suffolk County.
